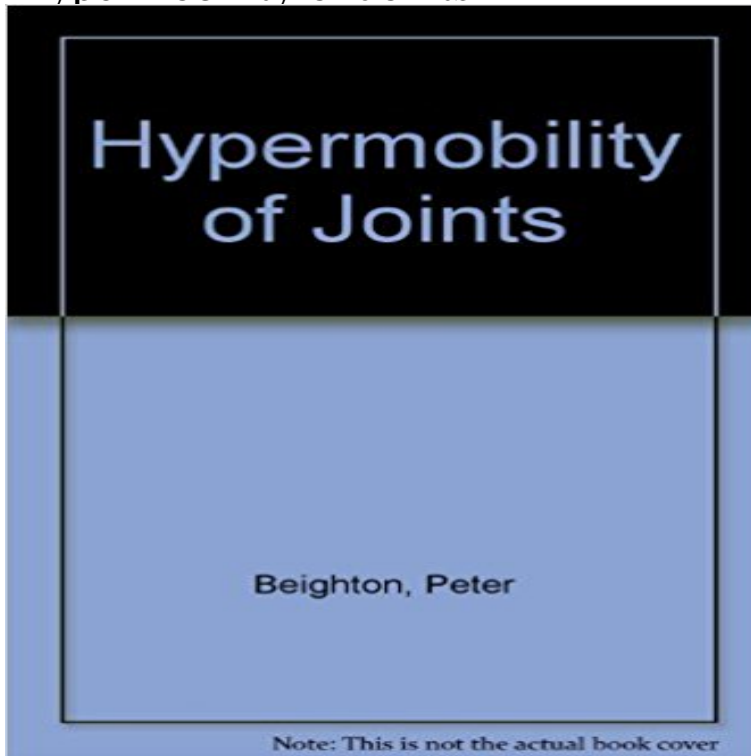


## Hypermobility of Joints
