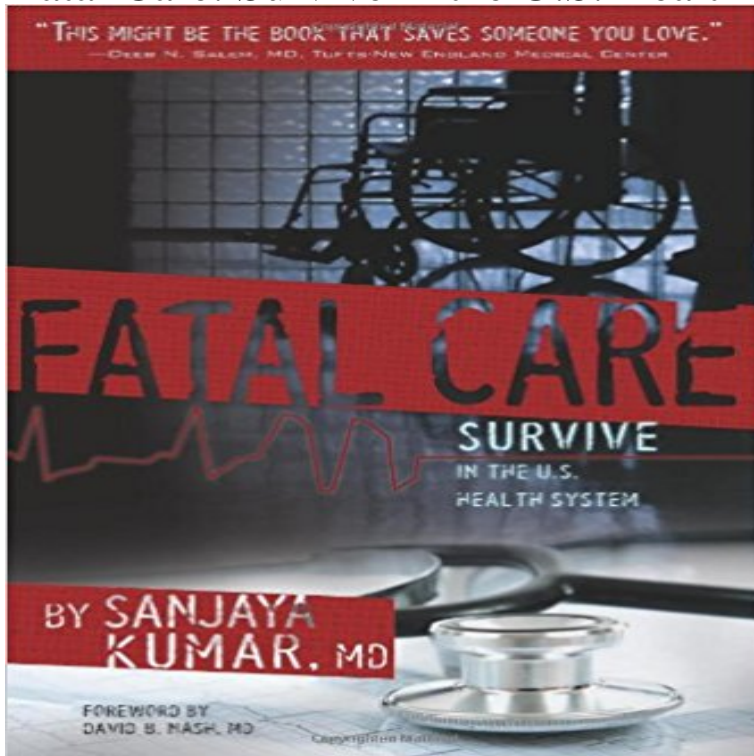


Fatal Care: Survive in the U.S. Health System
